These global meetings are all happening within a global pandemic which has further deepened poverty and inequality around the world. It will take massive public pressure to ensure leaders are not influenced by corporate lobbyists who are concerned about profit over people and the planet."

"We have an opportunity like no other. At the UN Biodiversity Conference (COP15) in October, world leaders can set meaningful targets to protect creation. In November, at the 26th UN Climate Change Conference (COP26), countries will announce their plans to meet the goals of the Paris agreement."

Review of advocacy efforts of the 2021 New York State legislative session

Our U.S. Catholic Bishops have taught us that "**participation in political life is a moral obligation**", but they never said it'd be easy. Catholics from the Rochester Diocese advocated with elected officials on many issues during the 2021 spring legislative session. Below is a summary of some of the results.

Some of these efforts turned out the way we wanted, and some didn't. We did not, and will not, give up. We keep our hands on the plow and remain faithful to the call to work for the Common Good.

Criminal Justice:

The Fair and Timely Parole and Elder Parole bills which we worked so hard to promote were not called to a vote on the floor of the Assembly or State Senate. This is heart-breaking for older incarcerated people and for their families. Don't give up this struggle!

But the HALT Solitary Confinement bill we advocated for was passed and signed into law! It will dramatically reduce the use of the torture that is solitary confinement n our state.

Economic Justice:

As previously reported, Nourish NY, the program that provides money to food banks to purchase food from New York State farmers and other NYS food producers, has become a permanent program in the NYS Dept. of Agriculture! The program received \$25M in March and will receive an additional \$25M in funding for the upcoming budget year. It's a win-win all around!

Respect for the Dignity of Human Life:

Thankfully, a bill to legalize of physician-assisted suicide failed to get voted out of committee. However, we must continue to be vigilant on this issue, as it will likely not go away soon.

A bill to legalize the composting of human remains was not called to a vote in either chamber. Similarly, we will need to continue to advocate against this affront to human dignity.
